
# ECITY BUDGET =

- West Hollywood ranks 12th in the state for per capita transit-occupancy tax revenues, coming in just behind other major tourist destinations like San Francisco, Los Angeles, Anaheim, Santa Monica, Beverly Hills, and Palm Springs.
- Decline in tourism following September 11 had a major impact on the City General Fund. Sales Tax and Transient Occupancy Tax declined in 2002, and it took several years to recover.
- West Hollywood ranks in the top 15% of all California cities in per capita property tax and sales tax revenues.

## **EXPENDITURES**

West Hollywood spends a significant amount of money on Human Services and Public Safety. West Hollywood's per capita spending on Human Services is among the highest in the State of California.

# WEST HOLLYWOOD GENERAL FUND EXPENDITURES




#### **TOURISM**

Approximately 1.2 million visitors come to West Hollywood each year, including many who stay overnight in our hotels.

Tourism generates \$812 million in business activity annually in West Hollywood, including direct and ancillary visitor spending.

There are 2,026 hotel rooms in West Hollywood.

## CAPITAL PROJECTS

- \* Most funding for capital projects comes from special funds outside of the General Fund.
- Examples of capital projects that are funded include:
  - o affordable housing funding (on-going)
  - o Santa Monica Boulevard improvement project (completed)
  - o City Library project
  - o Sunset Boulevard Repair & Repaving
  - o West Hollywood Park & Plummer Park improvements
- Funding for capital projects is collected over many years, and the City Council has a long-standing commitment to allocate \$1 million annually to capital projects. This is critical to ensure a high level of City facilities and amenities.
