Oh honey. My coming out story is SOSOSOSOS boring. I was the kid who played Wonder Woman while the other kids played trucks. They skateboarded and I learned the score to Little Mary Sunshine. I was in college, talking to my Mom and she said, "you sound bummed?" I responded, "yea Kevin and I broke up." "that's too bad. Why don't you come home for dinner I'll make your favorite." Dad...well he had to be schooled a little. His pro-gun, anti-choice, anti-feminism, pro-limbaugh was/is much more difficult.

## 3) How does being queer affect your artwork?

I am proud to say it defines my lens. I know everyone wants to be accepted as a great artist not a "add minority here" Artist. As though being woman or queer or of a different color marginalizes your merit. I say it empowers it.

Is my Mom going to read this? I celebrate pride the old fashioned way. I drink the no-longer-trendy-but-still-yummy-cosmo and try to kiss as many men as humanly possible.

As well, working in education, I know how necessary this kind of celebration is. It's not just for us. It's a beacon for all those kids who think they have nothing but shame.
