

THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD ANNOUNCES "WEHO ARTS: THE PLAN"

THE COMMUNITY FOCUSED CULTURAL PLANNING PROCESS WILL EXPLORE THE FUTURE OF THE ARTS, CULTURE, AND CREATIVITY IN WEST HOLLWYOOD

SOCIAL PRACTICE ARTISTS ALYSE EMDUR AND ROSTEN WOO WILL DEVELOP IMAGINATIVE PATHWAYS FOR ENGAGEMENT

West Hollywood, CA, June 20, 2016: Having recently marked its 30th anniversary of cityhood, the City of West Hollywood - led by its Arts and Cultural Affairs Commission (ACAC) and Arts and Economic Development Division (AEDD) - is looking to the future by inviting the community to participate in a far-reaching cultural planning process, Weho Arts: The Plan. The Plan will inform both ACAC's and AEDD's work for the next five to ten years.

The Arts and Cultural Affairs Commission has defined three main goals for *The Plan*:

- Celebrate the city's distinctive artistic and cultural identities.
- Identify and commemorate West Hollywood's support and advancement of the arts.
- Articulate a shared vision for the future: securing the position of arts and culture at the heart of our creative city.

With these goals in mind, throughout 2016, residents, visitors, and other interested individuals are invited to contribute to *The Plan* by participating in an interactive process consisting of formal and informal conversations, surveys, and artist-led activities. These interactions will provide insight and vision on West Hollywood's artistic and cultural ecosystem.

The City, ACAC and AEDD are deeply committed to the idea that the cultural planning process, and its results, must embody, support, and nurture West Hollywood's energetic creativity. As such, a team of social practice artists – Alyse Emdur and Rosten Woo – will join the core planning team (ACAC Commissioners, AEDD Staff and a cultural planning consultant) from June through December 2016 to create activities and experiences through which West Hollywood community members may contribute to *The Plan*.

Emdur and **Woo** were selected through an open request for qualifications by a special subcommittee comprising ACAC Commissioners. The artists will develop pathways for residents to imaginatively interact with the topics of artistic and cultural practice in the City of West Hollywood which, at 1.9 square miles in size, arguably has more art per square mile than any other city in the nation.

- LA-based photographer Alyse Emdur searches for deeper connections with her subjects, which often results in large format photography, video, or drawings. Her book, Prison Landscapes (2013), is a five-year exploration collecting 100 photographs of prison inmate's presenting themselves in front of the idealized landscapes of painted visiting-room backdrops, posing with their visitors and pretending, for a moment, that they are elsewhere. Her work has been exhibited in Printed Matter and the Lambent Foundation in NYC; the University of Texas Visual Arts Center in Austin, TX; the Philadelphia Photo Arts Center, PA; the Lab in San Francisco, CA; La Montagne Gallery in Boston, MA; and internationally in Tel Aviv, Israel, England, Paris, France Hertogenbosch, Netherlands. - Rosten Woo is an LA-based designer, writer, and educator who creates artistic engagements to help people understand complex systems, re-orient themselves to places, and participate in group decision-making. He is co-founder and former executive director of the Center for Urban Pedagogy (CUP), a New York-based non-profit dedicated to using art and design to foster civic participation. His work has been exhibited at Cooper-Hewitt Design Triennial, the Venice Architecture Biennale, Netherlands Architectural Institute, Storefront for Art and Architecture, Lower East Side Tenement Museum, and various piers, public housing developments, tugboats, shopping malls, and parks in New York and Los Angeles. He has written on design, politics, and music for publications inncluding Village Voice, Rolling Stone, City Limits, and Metropolis Magazine. His first book, Street Value, was published by Princeton Architectural Press in 2010.
