1. CALL TO ORDER

A special meeting of the West Hollywood Human Services Commission was called to order by Chair Jimmy Palmieri at 6:00 p.m., Tuesday, July 12, 2016, in the West Hollywood Park Public Meeting Room / City Council Chambers, 625 North San Vicente Boulevard, West Hollywood 90069.

A. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

C. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

The agenda was approved on a motion by Commissioner Cislowski.

D. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the meetings of June 28, 2016, and July 5, 2016, were approved, with Commissioner Shandrick abstaining as to the meeting of July 5.

E. PUBLIC COMMENT

2. CONSENT CALENDAR

There were no items on the Consent Calendar.

3. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. PUBLIC HEARING – FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SOCIAL SERVICES CONTRACTS

Elizabeth Savage, Director of Human Services and Rent Stabilization, spoke about the City's commitment to vital services by providing more than \$4.5 million in 2016-2017. She said that staff recommendations on Social Services contracts are focused on serving the most vulnerable and fragile community members, by providing the greatest good for those with the greatest need. The Request for Proposals (RFP) process has included input from multiple elements, including boards, commissions, and the community, and has been in response to Council Initiatives and special reports. She thanked the Human Services Commission and staff for their work on the funding process.

David Giugni, Social Services, Manager, said that 41 proposals were received, including 13 from agencies not currently contracting with the City. One agency (PATH) did not re-apply for funding. Proposals were evaluated on elements such as responsiveness to the RFP; program design; knowledge of target populations; knowledge of other agencies and collaborative service provision; current and past performance, where applicable; and the variety of each agency's funding sources, and any proposed matching funds, to achieve the strongest impact for the City's funding.

Staff reviewed recommendations for agencies which would be Social Services contractors new to the City, and enhanced proposals from existing contractors, including: Aid for AIDS, Being Alive, Bet Tzedek, JFS Comprehensive Services, LA LGBT Center's Mental Health program and services for Homeless Youth, NCJW's Youth Educational Programs and Services, Pathways, Project Angel Food, Ascencia, Men's Health Foundation, Planned Parenthood, and the Westside Center for Independent Living.

Also, the funding recommendations for \$4.5 million address the current needs with a caveat. With the high priority and need for services to support vulnerable community members, last year, the Council authorized additional funds. This need level is anticipated to continue and, to not cause reduced services and/or service interruption for the baseline of agency services. As a part of staff's responsibility in informing the Commission, this potential unmet need (substance abuse treatment and mental health for the homeless) will require additional consideration in the process. The amount is quantified at \$177,000 for substance abuse treatment and \$230,114 (Step Up on Second) for mental health services for the homeless, totaling \$407,114.

Staff noted the schedule for completion of the Social Services funding process, including recommendations by the Commission at its special meeting next Tuesday, July 19, followed by the staff report to the City Council on September 19.
