The City Council will receive the final legislative update with including the status of each bill for which the City took a position since the beginning of the 2019-2020 regular session of the California State Legislature (January 2019 through September 2020)

BACKGROUND / ANALYSIS:

This staff report has been prepared in accordance with the advocacy and lobbying plan approved by the City Council in December 2018. The report provides a final update on the outcome of the bills for which the City adopted a Support/Oppose position.

During this period, the legislative affairs team, which is comprised of City staff and the Sacramento-based lobbying firm Helyne Meshar & Associates (HM&A) has closely monitored a large number of bills that could have impacted the City. The team, after reviewing these bills, submitted its concerns and/or recommendations for amendments to the bills' authors and the City's representatives, Assemblymember Richard Bloom and Senator Ben Allen.

LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

During the 2019-2020 regular session of the California State Legislature, legislators and committees introduced a total of 5,423 bills (3,741 Assembly Bills and 1,682 Senate Bills) that either proposed new laws, repealed, or amended existing law.

As reported in the July 20, 2020 staff report that was submitted to the City Council (mid-year legislative report), the second year of the 2019-2020 regular session was seriously impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. An example of such impact on the Legislature's activities was the decision to pause the legislative session for almost three months and reconvene it in May 2020 with public access to committee hearings and deliberations of the two chambers available via video only. As a result of the shortened legislative calendar, the leadership of both chambers decided that only essential bills would be allowed to move forward. Bills deemed essential were those that addressed physical and behavioral health care, housing/homelessness, relief to renters and homeowners and emergency management, both of COVID-19 and wildfires.

As the legislative session came to a close at midnight on August 31^{st,} some important bills that had been deemed high priority were among many bills that did not make the midnight deadline to be sent to the Governor. Among the bills left stranded were housing production proposals and a number of police reform proposals.

FINAL OUTCOME OF LEGISLATION

As of August 31, 2020, which was the last day of the second year of the two-year session, the City had adopted positions on 78 bills. The following provides a status on the outcome of the bills the City supported/opposed.

The City supported 72 bills, and of those 72:

- 29 were signed into law (chaptered).
- 1 resolution was chaptered
- 3 bills were vetoed by the Governor.
- 39 bills died.

The City opposed 6 bills; and of those 6:

- 1 bill was signed into law (chaptered).
- 3 bills were vetoed by the Governor.
- 2 bills died.
